

ABSTRACT

While frequent readers are often stereotyped as socially awkward, this may only be true of non fiction readers and not readers of fiction. Comprehending character in a narrative fiction appears to parallel the comprehension of peers in the actual world, while the comprehension of expository non fiction shares no much parallels. Frequent fiction readers my thus bolster or mountain their social abilities unlike frequent readers of non fiction. Lifetime exposure to non fiction and non fiction text was examined along with performance on empathy or social acumen measures, in general fiction print exposure positively predicted measures of social ability while non fiction print exposure was a negative predictor. The tendency to become absorbed in a story also predicted empathy scores. Participant age, experience with English, and intelligence were statiscally controlled.

CHAPTER ONE INTRODUCTION

A. Background

In the United States, it is acknowledged that the state is capitalist, and it is not acknowledged that it is male. This condition reminds us about the history conventions. Barred from professional schools and most higher educations, forbidden to speak in public and even attend public conversations, and unable to own property. Intellectual women's drew parallels between themselves and women suffrage, despite social ostracism and sometimes financial ruins (Weekender magazine, April 2011: 25).

This descriptive source makes me more interested to know what is the definition of capitalism. The history of the word capitalism tells us something of the history of capitalism itself. According to the books source, I have found the definition about capitalism, Capitalism is a dynamic system whose profit driven mechanisms lead to the continual revolutionizing of the means of production and the forging of new market. (Barker, 2000:14). Then, the question is can capitalism survive? To answer this question I will identify why the mechanisms of capitalism also lead to perennial crises and will ultimately leading. Now suppose that the capitalist engine keeps on producing at that rate of increase for another half century starting from 1928, to this assumption there are various objections which will have to be noticed later on, but it cannot be objected to on the ground that in the decade 1929 to 1939 capitalism had already field to live up that standard. For the depression that ran its course from the last quarter of 1929 to the third quarter of 1932 does not prove that a secular break has occurred in the propelling mechanism of capitalist production because depressions of such as severity have repeatedly occurred (Schumpeter, 1994:59). According to this background,

I would analysis the paper I shall endeavor to establish that the actual perspective performance of the capitalist system such as to the negative the idea of its breaking down under the weight of economic failure.

Power is not simply the glue that holds the social together, or the coercive force which subordinates one set of people to another. Power also related to the owner, and the relation between owner and workers is the wage. For some reason the wage rates that firms will pay to workers are mainly determined by the productivity of workers, and by relative scarcity or abundance of workers with those skill (Journal Workers in a market economy, 1992:15). Everybody knows that this theory of value is unsatisfactory. In the voluminous discussion that has been carried on about it, the right is not indeed all on one side and many faulty arguments have been used by its opponents. My final conclusion, the essential point is not whether labor is the true "source" or causes of economic value.

In the novel Water for Elephants we can know circus as industrial culture. A circus is commonly a traveling company of performers that may include clowns, acrobats, trained animals, trapeze acts, musicians, hoopers, tightrope walkers, other stunt-oriented jugglers, unicyclists and artists (Taken from: http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Circus acceded date August, 30 2012). It is certainly possible to construct a base definition of capitalism and the process of creative destruction. Based on this definition it is impossible to discuss capitalism without discussing the image of capitalism. Then, in the novel Water for Elephants I have much information about the image of capitalism.

Sara Gruen as the author novel *Water for Elephants* was born in Vancouver, 1969. Her family lived in Northern California. She received her bachelor's degree in these fields at Carleton University. Gruen is an animal lover her experience became the source of her inspiration in writing. Next, *Water for Elephants* tells a story about Jacob Jankowski, a 93 year old man living in a nursing home. His parents passed away in a car wreck, turning his word upside down. Jacob walked out of his final exam and hopped town, climbing on the first train he could. He quickly found out that it was no ordinary train. It belonged to the Benzini Brothers Most Spectacular show on earth, a traveling circus. August, the owner seemed like a nice guy. But his true colors came out when times got tough. And worst of all Jacob fell in love with the beautiful performer Marlena, who just happened to be August's wife.

So, if an animal can be human that probably means that human can be animals. Rosie performs for others and is abused by August. Rosie is a kind of outsider who falls into circus life by accident and almost doesn't succeed, she is just an elephant.

"In the morning light I see what I couldn't last night the wagons are painted scarlet, with gold trim and sunburst wheels, each emblazoned with the name Benzini Bros Most Spectacular Show On Earth. As soon as the wagons are hitched to teams, the Percherons lean into their harnesses and drag their heavy loads across the field". (Gruen, 2007:33).

many variables many of which are not amenable to anything like measurement. The actual and prospective performance of the capitalism system is such as to negative the idea of its breaking down under the weight of economic failure.

In this paper I want to stress about the circus as industrial culture, and I would give detail concept civilization of capitalism in chapter three. In my view these problems derived from identifications of civilization of capitalism with circus. To define a process of creative destruction in this way still implies connection between civilization of capitalism and circus as industrial culture.

B. Identification of the Problem

A circus as part of stage activity that showing entertainment. The word "recreation" brings to mind activities that are relaxing and enjoyable (Althen, 1988:98). "I peer inside. The tent is enormous, as tall as the sky and supported by long, straight poles jutting at various angles. The canvas is taut and nearly translucent sunlight filters through the material and seams, illuminating the largest candy stand of all. It's smack in the center of the menagerie, under rays of glorious light, surrounded by banners advertising sarsaparilla, Cracker Jack, and frozen custard".

"Brilliantly painted red and gold animal dens line two of the four walls, their sides propped open to reveal lions, tigers, panthers, jaguars, bears, chimps, and spider monkeys even on orangutan. Camels, Ilamas, Zebras, and horses stand behind low ropes slung between iron stakes, their heads buried in mounds of hay. Tow giraffes stand within an area enclosed by chain link fence". (Gruen, 2007:39).

The quotation is giving information that Benzini Brother is company circus that is part of industrial culture which is the aim surplus in income. August, the owner show the power and want to achieve the target his stage circus.

To understand economic development in feudalism, we have to start from the consideration of the social relations which constitute feudal lords as social actors wielding both politics (authoritative) and economic (allocative) power. The dynamic of these social relations, I will argue, is decisively shaped by the struggles over the control of "authoritative" resources conflict over power seem to be decisive for the nature of social development under feudalism. But only if we constantly remind ourselves that, in dealing with feudalism, relation of domination also constitute relation of exploitation (in a very different and much more immediate way than in capitalism), can we develop an account of the structure and transcendence of feudalism that does justice to the specificity of its constitutive social relations.

In this chapter, I will lay the foundations for this argument by taking issue with the civilization of capitalism in the stage of circus is new fact of the failure economic value system.

C. Limitation of the Problem

Based on identification of the problem, I would like to limit the problem in relation with the concept of capitalism economy, the theory is I used are:

F. Framework of the Theory

1. Intrinsic approach

a. Characterization

b. Setting

In order to understand the purpose and function of setting, the reader must pay particular attention to the descriptive passages in which the details of setting are introduced. The most important fictional settings are those that are "dramatic". Setting in fiction is called on to perform a number of desired functions. Setting may serve:

- 1. To provide background for the action.
- 2. As and antagonist.
- 3. As a means of creating appropriate atmosphere.
- 4. As a means of revealing character, and
- 5. As a means of reinforcing theme.

c. Plot

A plot is also a narrative of events, the emphasis falling on causality. Below is part of plot:

- 1. The expositions, is the beginning section in which the author provides the necessary background information, sets the scene, establish the situation, and dates the action. It may also introduce the characters and the conflict, or the potential for conflict (Pickering, Hoeper, 1981:16).
- 2. The complication, which is sometimes referred to as the rising action, breaks the existing equilibrium and introduces the characters and the

- underlying or inciting conflict. The conflict is then developed gradually and intensified (Pickering, Hoeper, 1981:17).
- 3. The crisis (also referred to as the climax) is that moment at which the plot research its point of greatest emotional intensity, it is the turning point of the plot directly precipitating its resolutions (Pickering, Hoeper, 1981:17).
- 4. Falling action, once the crisis, or turning point, has been reached, the tension subsides and the plot moves towards its appointed conclusions (Pickering, Hoeper, 1981:17).
- 5. Resolution is the final section of the plot is it resolution, it records the outcome of the conflict and establishes some new equilibrium or stability (how ever tentative and momentary) (Pickering, Hoeper, 1981:17).

2. Extrinsic approach

a. Civilization approach

Methods how to analyze that I use in assessing this novel as below description: "...the rational attitude presumably forced itself on the human mind primarily from economic necessity as a tool". (Barker, 2000:14). This quotation shows about the effort how to be living with rational attitude. The process of achieving things and circus as the example of civilization in this novel show the effort how to be struggle in life.

1. Private ownership of property.

b. Capitalism approach

Next, Capitalism is a dynamic system whose profit driven mechanism lead to the continual revolutionizing of the means of the production and the forging of new market (Barker, 2000:14).
