She continued to write when she attended Huntingdon College in Montgomery, Alabama, from 1944 to 1945. In 1945, she transferred to the University of Alabama in Tuscaloosa to study law. But, she left the university in 1949 without completing her degree. While at Alabama Lee wrote columns, feature stories, and satires for the university newspaper and literary publications. In 1949, she left Alabama to pursue a literary career in New York.

To Kill A Mockingbird is Lee's best known novel. The novel tells a story about a young girl named Jean Louise (Scout) Finch who lives with her brother, Jem, and their widowed father, Atticus, in Alabama town of Maycomb. Maycomb is suffering through the Great Depression, but Atticus is a prominent lawyer and the Finch family is reasonably well off in comparison to the rest of society.

Scout and Jem's mother is passed away when Scout is two years old. So, Scout grows up without knowing how to love and be loved by a mother.

One summer, Jem and Scout meet a boy named Dill. He has come to live in their neighborhood for the summer. They often act out stories together. Eventually, Dill becomes fascinated with the mysterious house on their street called Radley Place. The house is owned by Mr. Nathan Radley, whose brother, Arthur Radley (nicknamed Boo), has lived there for fifteen years without venturing outside.

Scout goes to school for the first time that fall and detests it. Then one day, she finds a chewing gum in a knot-hole of a tree on Radley property. At first, Jem distrusts it

as a poisoned gum. Until one day, they find gifts apparently left for them in a knot-hole of the tree. Dill returns the following summer. Scout, Jem, and Dill begin to act out the story of Boo Radley. Atticus stops their act. Then, on Dill's last night in Maycomb for the summer, they sneak onto the Radley house, where Nathan Radley shoots at them. Jem loses his pant in the ensuing escape. When he returns for it, he finds it mended and hung over the fence.

The next winter, Jem and Scout find more presents in the tree. They are presumably left by the mysterious Boo. Nathan Radley eventually plugs the knot-hole with cement. Shortly thereafter, a fire breaks out in another neighbor's house. During the fire someone puts a blanket on Scout's shoulders as she watches the blaze. Jem convinced that Boo Radley did it. Then, Jem begins to tell his father almost about Scout and his secret, about the mended pants and the presents.

One day, Atticus is involved in Maycomb's racist white community. He agrees to defend a black man named Tom Robinson, who has been accused of raping a white woman. Because of his decision, Jem and Scout are subjected to abuse from other people.

At the end of the story, Scout and Jem are saved by Arthur (Boo) Radley from Bob Ewell's attack. After that, Scout feels as though she can finally imagine what life is like for Boo. He has become a human being to her at last. With this realization, Scout embraces her father's advice to practice sympathy and understanding, and demonstrates that her experiences with hatred and prejudice will not sully her faith in human goodness.

Based on the summary above, Scout Finch is a good kid. She has experienced many things and learns how to improve her quality of being humane throughout the story.

In this research, I will show that humanity is something important that moves Scout Finch's character to be a good person in her society.

The reason why I choose this novel is because it has many moral lessons and an important role in literary work in its era until now. That is why I want to analyze it. The main problem that I want to analyze is the character of Scout Finch who has developed her humanity side which is influenced by her environment, especially by her father and brother.

B. Identification of the Problem
