CHAPTER I

INTRODUCTION

A. Background of the Research

Humans always feel and develop in accordance with their experiences which are learning process in their life. Humans are creates individuals and social beings. The Chapman Report by Irving Wallace becomes an international bestseller, who tells about six women, Sarah, Kathleen, Ursula, Teresa, Mary and Naomi from the better side of Los Angeles. But I just choose one character of the six women, Sarah Goldsmith, and then I want to analysis her life who have destroy by a third person, Fred Tauber. Sarah Goldsmith is a wife of Sam Goldsmith who feels bored with her husband, because he cannot satisfying her. The meaningless feeling in her life and her marriage to Sam makes her unhappy and it causes her to seek a happier life than what they have passed. Then, she meets with the another man whose face and his personality more interesting than her husband, finally makesher unfaithful to her husband.

B. Identification of the Problem

Based on the background of problem above, I identify the problem of this research is: Sarah Goldsmith's life begins to change when her life and married life with Sam Goldsmith is boring and feel dissatisfaction in her marriage life. Until the affair is inevitable to fulfill her sex life satisfaction because she thinks that her husband is not able to satisfy her sexual desire as a result of the lack of fulfillment of the level of needs. C. Limitation of the Problem

- 4. What does the theme of this novel reinforce through the results of analysis of the intrinsic and extrinsic approaches?

E. Objectives of the Research

Based on the formulation of the problem above, the purpose of research is to prove that the theme of this novel is the reflection of dissatisfaction and unfaithfulness in Irving Wallace's novel *The Chapman Report*. To achieve this purpose, I take some steps as follows:

- To analyze characterization of this novel through showing and telling methods.
- 2. To analyze setting and plot in this novel.
- 3. To analyze this novel by elaborating the concepts of with the characterization, setting and plot.
- 4. To reinforce the theme by using the reult of analysis of the intrinsic and extrinsic approaches.

F. Methods of the Research

Based on the framework of the theories above, I use qualitative method. Qualitative methods is a broad term that can be applied to a range of research approaches that have their theoritical origins in a range of disciplines, include anthropology, sociology, philosophy, social psychology and linguistics.
